Preface

Three brothers from Raelingen, Norway--Christian, Thorer, and Jacob (Baardson) Bolson, came to midwestern U.S.A. probably in response to economic pressures at home and in hopes of a more abundant life in the western world.

Norway is three-fourths mountains and most of the other fourth is forest covered. Crops were never plentiful. Land passed to the oldest son, and employment was hard to get. Small wonder thousands of Norwegians came in the 1850's to America, presumed to be a land of opportunity with its vast farming areas and ever expanding labor market.

Maren Tveter, sister of the three brothers, had planned also to come, but it is said she changed her mind while on the pier. She stayed behind, married, and raised three sons, two of whom came also to America.

It has been our purpose to write a narrative history of these emigrants and their descendants. We have set the stage with a short history of their progenitors in Norway. For this portion we are indebted to Olav Tveter's work.

The Bolson brothers came to Northeastern Iowa and settled in Glenwood Township in Winneshiek County and from there progeny has spread widely. Maren Tveter's son, Otto, came to Tacoma, Washington, and moved on to Alberta, Canada, and his descendants have spread out from there into Canada and back into the U.S.A.

We find descendants of these people in every walk of life -farmers, teachers, printers, nurses, doctors, preachers, military
men, pilots, and craftsmen of all kinds. They have proved that
this was indeed the land of opportunity when coupled with hard
work, integrity, and godliness.

The History Committee, which was named at the Tveter-Bolson Reunion in 1974, consisted of Hubert Bolson, Alma Brynsaas, Norman Brynsaas, and Esther Miller. At the 1977 Reunion Esther Miller was asked to be coordinator for the project.

The Committee now presents for your pleasure this narrative history and wants to thank everyone who cooperated in supplying information. The Committee used as a guide the 1971 edition of the chronological history of the Tveter-Bolson family, which, in turn, was based on an earlier record made in 1950 by Rebecca Bolson, Josephine Stephens, and Evelyn Stephens. We extend our thanks to them for laying the ground work. We also express thanks to Leanne Goettelman, our typist, who has worked with great patience and skill.

The Committee herein passes on to you the stories supplied to them. No attempt has been made to authenticate these stories. It has been the purpose of the Committee to let the personalities of the people in this history be reflected when possible, to accentuate the good and positive, and to let shortcomings and failings go unnoted.

The Committee knows that there is much more that could be written and that errors inevitably creep in despite the care that has been taken. We would urge you to make additions, corrections, and add your own pictures and news clippings. Make this history a growing thing. Keep it updated. Share information with others.


May God continue to bless this family as he has done in the past. May each Bolson descendant live so he is a credit to his heritage.



You will note that in the compilation of this book a numbering system has been used which may need a word of explanation. Number 1 has been given to Axel, and since everyone herein is descendant from Axel, each number begins with 1. Baard, being the second son of Axel, has the number 12. All Bolsons and Tveters herein are descendant from Baard, so all have 12 in their numbers. This history concerns itself with only four of Baard's children, Maren, given number 124, she being the 4th child; Christian, given number 128, he being the 8th child; Thorer, given number 12(10), he being the 10th child, and Jacob, given number 12(14), he being the 14th child. The numbering process moves on in this fashion, and when you learn to interpret it, it can at a glance give you much information.

Axel Anderson Tveter m. Kari Baardsdatter Teien, 1774

They were married in Raelingen and in 1785 bought a part of northern Tveter, and the place was called Stua (house) of Tveter. Kari inherited some money from her father, who was a sawyer. Axel liked good brandy wine and came into trouble with the law. When his case came up, Kari appeared instead of (or on behalf of) Axel and argued that it was another who caused Axel to become tipsy. She told her man's case with clarity. The couple had seven children. (Trans. from letter by Olaf Tveter of Raelingen, Norway)

Anders Axelson Tveter b. 1775 m. Anne Nilsdatter of South Tveter b. 1789

They had twins, Ole and Christian, born in 1825, both of whom married girls from Sundhagen. They were loggers in Øyeren. Both have many relatives in Sundhagen. Some of their descendants migrated to the U.S.A. in 1880 to 1881. They began to call themselves "Hagen." (Trans. Ibid.)

Baard Axelson Tveter b. 1776 d. 1849
m. Marte Olsdatter, 1809, a widow lady, who died a year later.
m. Johanne Nilsdatter Lund, 1881. She was from Fetsund.

When he was only 20 years old, Baard took with him two spokesmen and rowed over Øyeren on a courtship trip to Lund. The advocates were two of the best men in the parish, and all three were well received. They were invited at once to eat, but the custom was that they must not eat until they had carried out their The woman in Lund said, "You may as well eat because I have just as big a butter stick which you can have afterwards." When the two advocates had said their piece and had praised Baard Tweter as a fine man and had said that it must be nice to get such a man for a son-in-law, the mother answered, "Man and woman! Man and woman there must be if there is to be a housewife at Tveter." At any rate, it was thus that a wedding came about. To this union were born 14 children. (Trans. Ibid.) Baard leased a farm from 1811 to 1840 when he acquired a king's deed to property with woodland for 550 spd. Baard was among the first to serve in the local government in Fet. Parts of the Tveter woods were sold from time to time, some by Baard and some by his widow. A portion of it was purchased again by the grandson, Brede, and restored to the Tveter homestead. Johanne in 1854 borrowed 600 spd. to buy tickets and sent her three sons to America. She may not have gotten her money She saved a letter written in America by son, Thorer, which follows as translated by Norman Brynsaas:

"Dear Brother and cousins,

"I received your most welcome letter of September 23, the 20th of Feb. and see with joy that you are all well and active to date, and the same can I gladly say again that we are all well to this date, and for this we must give hearty thanks to God. Because our health is the greatest wealth we have in this life. For what help is it to have plenty of everything if our health fails because then one would gladly give all to get one's health again.

"It pleases me to see that you had a reasonably good year and that you are pushing yourself ahead and ahead of many others, but I think also that I can truthfully say about you as Nils Lund said about me that I would be a good American, and his words have not failed him because now you can imagine whether I could have progressed in Norway and raised my family.

"I have 5 children living and one deceased. When I came to Quebec I had 300 dollars, and now you could not buy my farm and my personal property for 3000 dollars.

"And on this I am owing 300 dollars. Wages for the working man pays better here at all jobs. But the best of all here in this land where the pay is so good is that a man can see his children go out and prosper as soon as they are grown.

"A young man if he is reliable and efficient can save enough to buy a little farm when he is full grown 20-25 years.

"I had a young man for 6 months this summer that had not filled his 15th year and for this I gave him 50 dollars. Now I have hired a man for one year and shall give him 165 dollars for this. He has his family back in Norway, a wife and 5 children whom he is expecting later this summer. He has sent them 158 dollars but this will not be more than 98 back in Norsk money. He is from Trondhjem. He was owing on his own fare. He has been here $1\frac{1}{2}$ years. It seems to be a good way for him to get away from his own poverty. Now if his family gets here in good condition, he will be free of worries for the future.

"I must now tell what sort of year we had. It was an average year, but prices have been good. 1.50 dollars per bushel (36 liter) for wheat, 50 cents for corn (maiskornet), 40 cents for oats and 1.21 for barley.

"I got 400 bushels of wheat, 25 bu. oats, 400 bu. corn, and 82 bu. barley. But the corn and oats I have not sold as I need it as feed for the pigs and horses of which I have 5 in number.

"I have no other news to tell other than I must say that we are to build a new church because the one we have is too little.

The new one is to cost 5000 dollars and that sum is levied on the farmers that belong to the congregation according to property. On me it is \$68.25. (The church referred to is Glenwood Lutheran.)

"It is to be built of stone.

"No more to tell this time, but with friendliest greetings from all of us together, but first and last from myself.

"I also want to greet all from our brother Christian and his family they are all well and healthy to date.

"My wife was to their home yesterday with this letter to see how it was with them also if they had some news to tell but they had none.

"I must tell that I have bought 40 acres of land more and have made plans to add 3 rooms to my house, they will be plastered and papered and the rest I have painted blue inside and out, so now we have it quite pretty and pleasant. But it cost me over 300 dollars.

"And I bought 24 small apple trees that I planted this spring and plan to buy 30 more this spring which I have made place for.

"It does not say anything about Nils in this letter you sent me. You must greet him and his wife from us all, and greet all my friends of boyhood days.

"Adjö and live well in the name of Christ. These wishes from me.

His mother, Johanna, became ill soon thereafter and died a little later. The couple had no children. The farm was taken over by Nils, his next younger brother, and Maren, his sister. (Ibid.)

m. Marie Amundsdatter Narvestad, 1857. They had no children. Nils was a spry man. He could hop and jump to the roof after he was 70 years old. He used tar as a medicine both internally and externally. When a sore would not heal, he heated a tar stick and dripped the heated tar into the sore. Believe it or not, he would get it to heal.

They had five children, three boys who lived to maturity, a daughter who lived to the age of 22, and a daughter who died in infancy. Maren was a milk maid in her youth. It is said she fought off a bear to save a sheep while at the Tveter saeter. At home on the farm she went out one day to get hay for the cows. She got ahold of the foot of a tramp as she reached into the hay. The tramp had taken up his night's lodging in the barn. He jumped and screamed but the housewife held tight until brother Nils came and knocked out the tramp. (Trans. from a letter by Olaf Tveter) It is said that Maren was to have come to America with her three brothers who were the first to leave Raelingen for the new land, but Maren changed her mind when she reached the pier.

Christian left Norway at 29 years of age and came to America in 1854. He bought land in Glenwood Township, Winneshiek County, Iowa, the same year. He came to be known by the name Bolson. In 1856 he married Martha who had come to America from Brandbu. Hadeland. Martha and her sister, Kari, left Norway on April 17. They were for 11 weeks on the water encountering terrific storms and icebergs. At one time they counted 70 icebergs and sailed among them for a whole week. They landed safely in Quebec. However, here many passengers contracted cholera and died. Martha and her sister were spared. After three weeks more of travel by water and land, they arrived in Iowa. (Ruen family history) Martha and Christian were married, and they lived on their Glenwood land until the last year of Christian's life when they moved to the home of their son, Edwardt. After Christian's death, Martha went to live with daughter, Caroline (Sorenson). Martha lived for 8 years with the Sorenson family. She was bedridden and nearly blind for years. During her last year she was totally blind. She died of old age in 1914. Both she and her husband are buried in the Glenwood Cemetery. Rev. Otto Schmidt conducted the funeral services for Martha at the Sorenson home, and Rev. Olaf Scarvie officiated at the services at the Glenwood Church.

Christian Bolson gave land for the construction of a school which became known as District #8 and was attended by a great many Bolson off-spring.

Thorer Baardsen, later known as Bolson, came to America at 26 in 1854 with his brothers, Christian and Jacob. He settled in Winneshiek County, Glenwood Township that same year. He farmed, and it is said he aspired to own a thousand acres of land, and he achieved that goal. He made charcoal, sold cordwood, kept bees, raised an apple orchard, had a horse-powered threshing machine, and built the first Bolson bridge over the Upper Iowa River. He served in the Civil War.

Thorer Bolson's military record shows his name as Toerer Bollson, Private. Sometimes the name appears as "Turren." Company descriptive book records that he was 37 years old, five feet and five and three quarters inches tall, complexion "dark", eyes "blue", hair "brown", born "Norway", a "farmer" enlisted October 20, 1864, at Decorah, Iowa, for one year. He was discharged July 3, 1865.

His detachment arrived at Chattanooga, Tennessee, on November 18, 1865. On March 26, 1865, he was at "Goldsboro, N.C. Recruit from depot." In March and April 1865 and in May and June, as well, he was marked "present." At this time he was docked 62 cents for lost ordnance stores. He mustered out at Louisville, Kentucky, on

July 21, 1865, with \$26.30 due him in pay. From this the Army deducted the 62¢ for lost ordnance and \$6.00 for his Springfield rifle that he retained.

Three years later his wife, Karen, died.

It has been said that Thorer was a slight man, but that he did not permit anyone to shove him around.

He was appointed guardian of his brother Jacob's children. Jacob died in the war, and the appointment was made when his widow remarried.

m. Helena Enga from Hokedal. He came to America in 1854 at 18 with his brothers, Christian and Thorer. He became known as Jacob Bolson. He served in the Civil War, enlisting on August 25, 1862, with Company K, 38th Regiment, Iowa Infantry. He enlisted for three years. At that time he was 26 years old. His military file states that he was a farmer, that he was born in Norway. His Muster-in-Roll was dated at Camp Franklin, Ia., on November 4, 1862. It stated that he was blue of eye, light haired, and light complexioned, and 5'8" tall. He "received \$25 Bounty and \$2 premium."

From November 4, 1862 to February 28, 1863, the roll shows him as "present" and "Received no monthly pay except for one month, termed advance pay."

Through March, April, May, and June of 1863 he was "present." For July and August he is shown "Absent" as he was "sent on board Hospital Boat, 'John J. Roe' at Port Hudson, Louisiana, August 12, 1863, by order of Surgeon." His status was reported the same for September, October, November, and December, January, and February of 1864. (Obviously he was not still on board the hospital ship.) Then in March and April rolls show him as "absent without leave since April 10, 1864", and this report is duplicated for May and June, July and August before they finally learned that he died of dysentery on October 31, 1863. The September and October Muster Roll state "Died at Lansing, Iowa, October 31, 1863. Final Statements made out."

There exists an extensive and interesting Army pension file in Washington, D.C. relative to Jacob Bolson. The old jacket cover for the pension file exists showing the amount of pension granted (\$8.00 per month). The papers have since been placed into newer folders and among the papers one finds Helena Bolson's original application for a pension as a Civil War widow.

To get the pension, it became necessary to prove that she was married to Jacob, that Jacob was in the war, and that he died as

a result of illness or injury incurred while in the service. The application gives her age 23, their marriage date as January 20, 1860, and lists her two children, Josephine and John. Niels and Sam Hanson witnessed the document before an Anthony Rockswold.

The file contains Doctor's death certificate, a copy of the Military Surgeon's original authorization for the furlough on medical grounds, and the furlough granted as a result.

Helena's proof of marriage became something more than routine because Jacob was married using the name "Jacob Huardson." He was probably using the name "Jacob Baardson" and because of poor penmanship on somebody's part, it became corrupted into "Huardson." Documents on this matter infer that the confusion arose because "he is a Norwegian."

The next document is a statement by Nelson Hanson and Bertha Gilbrenson before Notary Nelson Burdick to the effect that they had known Jacob for five years prior to enlistment and could swear that Jacob had two names and that it was he who married Helena Enga under the name of "Huardson." A second such statement appears sworn to by Clerk of Court S.W. Mattison.

Next one finds a standard form record of service from the U.S. Adjutant General's office. Then there appears a statement by Jacob's C.O., Lt. Freeman, who states the circumstances under which Jacob first became troubled with "irregularity."

At this point the claim was obviously accepted, as there are no further documents filed until Helena applied for an increase in the pension. This was probably in response to a new law passed in 1866 which would allow \$2.00 per month more for each dependent child. She had only to prove that she had such children by Jacob and had not remarried. She would then qualify. Her application for increase is on file, accompanied by a sworn statement by Cornelia Hogenson that she witnessed the birth of Josephina and knew Jacob to have been the father; also a statement by Betsy Lewis to the effect that she knew John was Jacob and Helena's child. Apparently Atty. Burdick upset the application because Helena had to make a subsequent statement to prove why her name was not the same as on the original pension. The final acceptance of her application for increase was signed and became effective July 25, 1866.

On December 4, 1868, Helena married Wilhelm Webjornson. She gave guardianship of the children to Thorer Bolson who made application for continuation of the pension in his name. The next document is the Clerk of Court's proof that Thorer was indeed the legal guardian. This is followed by an acceptance of the transfer of pension. There being no more documents in the file, we can assume the pension was paid without interruption until the children reached the age of 16.

Helena had eight children by her second marriage.

CHILDREN OF MAREN (TVETER) AND JOHANNES OLSEN TOMTER-TVETER

The couple leased the Tomter farm from Otto's father and later they leased from Arnes. Later Otto became a merchant at Bogstadveien 42 in Oslo and built the building at Bogstadveien 62 which still stands, but then came "et stort krakk" (a big crash) and many had to give up their businesses. For awhile they worked on the farm for Gunda's uncle. In 1905 they went to America with their whole family. They had 10 children of whom only the youngest (Benny) was born in the new world. They came first to Tacoma, and later homesteaded in Alberta, Canada.

The following was written by Otto and Gunda's youngest son, Bennie Tweter of Arcadia, Neb., and tells of the family life.

"My earliest recollection of my parents was when we lived in Tacoma, Wash. We moved to Tawatinaw, Alberta, Canada, (60 miles north of Edmonton on the C.N.R.) where Dad took up 160 acres of virgin land as a homestead that was offered by the Alberta government. We were pretty poor at that time, but we did buy a cow, some pigs, chickens, plowed up the ground in which we sowed oats and barley. Like others of our neighbors, we ate partridges, rabbits, and sometimes moose meat. I can still remember how we used lard instead of butter, or syrup, on our bread. Butter and peanut butter were a "treat" which we had on occasion. Also we had cranberries and blueberries, and at times apples, made into sauce and jam. Mother was a good provider, canning berries and vegetables we grew for the winter season. I always was happy to have the Lutheran minister visit our community about every other month, for nearly always he stayed with us, and then mother brought out all the good things saved up, butter, jam, cakes, and cookies! Dad was instrumental in getting a church building erected for worship so that we could have Sunday school classes on Sunday. had a team of horses with which we did all our farm work, as tractors had not yet been invented -- or at least not in use in our part of the country! Every summer Dad put up a lot of hay for the herd of cattle and horses that we accumulated through the years.

My memories of mother are few, but what I have are precious. Mother was sick at times and had to enter the General Hospital in Edmonton a time or two. The last time I saw her was when she had me called in from play, had me sit down on her bed as she told me

that she was going to the hospital again. She must have had the intuition that she would go to be with the Lord, for she carefully related to me the story of Jesus' death on the cross for our sins. I was too young to apply its truth to myself, so was not saved till later in life. But as a teen-ager, when I passed into that rebellious stage and gave my father cause for worry, my sister, Ruth, (home at that time) took me aside and gave me a scolding, then informed me that mother had prayed before she died that I would grow up to be a minister of the Gospel. She had gotten the assurance that her prayer would be answered, and it was, even though she did not live to see her prayer answered here on earth! (God did more than call me to the ministry, for he sent me to China for 15 years as a missionary!)

My last recollections of Dad on the farm was his coming from doing chores, then getting out his Bible and reading it and silently praying as he sat at the diningroom table. At times I saw he was in tears, and the sight brought conviction to my heart, for I felt that I must be the cause of it. Later, with spiritual perception, and from what Ruth and Helga told me, I have reason to believe his was a repentant heart for times he had caused mother pain. When I left for China I bade sister Ragna (in New Norway on their farm) good-by; Dad was there too, but he knew from the railway schedule that he could cross country and see me once more at Edmonton where we had our final good-by. He died in Morrin, Ruth and Andrew Kallevig's farm was there, before I got back for furlough."

Brede was a farmer and bought Tveter homestead from his father in 1889. The Nordstua (north house) he had purchased two years earlier from his uncle, Nils Baardson. Brede was a clever and ambitious man. It is told that he was the first in Raelingen to acquire "kalosjer" (galoshes). When he was going to get married he bought a carriage which was the finest in the community. It was shiny and "lakkert", with two padded seats with the front seat facing backward. A high driver's seat was placed to the back. On each side at the front of the carriage was a shiny light which lighted up the way well ahead about like on our cars today.

Brede bought in 1880 a thrashing machine (piggmaskin) mounted on wheels and he went about thrashing for the farmers. He had 10 to 12 cows and hauled milk to Oslo each week. In 1900 he built an apartment building with eight units in it in Strømmen. He moved there with his family and worked in real estate. But in 1907 he became ill, and he moved his family back to Tveter again. Brede was among those who built Grini "bedehus" (chapel). In Strømmen he had conducted a Sunday School for children. He was ill for 10 years and died in 1917. He is buried at the Raelingen church. (Trans. from "Slekten Fra Tveter i Raelingen")

He left for America when he was 17 years old. He played cards on the ship and lost all his money. He had to return from England and fetch more money to start the trip over. Some say he was first a cowboy in Texas and helped tame wild horses. It is certain that he was in Alaska to dig for gold, but he thought this was a poor way to make a living so he set up instead a cafe where he sold coffee to the other gold diggers and made out better at that. Later he went to Tacoma and set out to be a builder, constructed a house, and sold it, and then he became wealthy. He was home (in Norway) for a visit in 1890, but he had a full beard and no one recognized him. His own brother, Otto, walked past him at Arnes, and neither spoke. At home at Tveter he rapped on the Inside sat his mother, and looked right at the stranger who greeted (her), but she did not invite him to sit and he was left staring at "vegger og tak" (walls and ceiling). So he asked if this wasn't Tveter place, and the mother couldn't imagine what this strange man wanted here. At last he had to tell who he was and then there got to be "stas" (celebration). He returned to Tacoma and did not return home again. When he died he gave his whole fortune to a mission society. Census of Winneshiek County 1880 shows that Julius Tveter, age 18, was a boarder of Christian Bolson at the time of census taking.

CHILDREN OF OTTO AND GUNDA (KRAGERUD) TVETER

124 21 Anna Marie

b. Dec. 31, 1882 d. Jan. 15, 1951

m. Hans Tveter

b. 1869 d. 1960

"The unusual fact regarding Anna was that she married a man, unrelated to us as far as I know, who also was named Tveter! I believe that Hans Tveter was a laboring man while we all lived in Tacoma. Then he took up a homestead in Peace River, which is in the northern part of Alberta." They had four sons (From letter by Bennie John Tweter, Arcadia, Neb. 1977)

Hans and Anna Marie were married in North Dakota in 1908. They immigrated to Canada in 1913. They stayed one year in the Edmonton area. Then they came up the Edson Trail to Pauce Coupe, B.C., where they homesteaded. In 1923 they came to Valhalla Centre where Hans drove the cream truck between Valhalla Centre and Grand Prairie. Later they started farming at LaGlace and the farm is still in the family being operated by a grandson, Lawrence Tveter, son of Stanley Tveter.

124 22 Jorgen (George)

b. Nov. 15, 1884 d. Nov. 13, 1954

m. Marie Nelson b. ? d. Jan. 13, 1919

Jorgen homesteaded in Canada at Tawatinaw, Alberta, taking a quarter, near his father's land adjoining it on one side, joining brother Olaf's on another side, and his brother-in-law, Trygve

Haug's land on the third side. George kept cattle, chickens, and pigs. He worked for a time in the mines with Olaf in Idaho. Later he moved to Tacoma, Washington, where he had lived before going to Canada. Marie, his wife, died in Tawatinaw during the "flu epidemic." In Tacoma George married a Morman lady. He did well as a cabinet-maker and his work was much in demand. "My recollection of his first wife, Marie Nelson, is sketchy. She was a good mother. When we kids played outside on the swing she would give us fresh baked bread with jam on it, and did we enjoy the treat." They had one son, Arnold, and one daughter, Georgianne. (Ibid.)

124 23 Helga Pauline b. Nov. 7, 1888 d. 1967 m. Trygve Haug. b. Jan. 14, 1885 d. 1957

Helga was born in Oslo, Norway, and came to the U.S.A. with her parents in 1905. They came first to Tacoma, Washington. She met and married Trygve and their first child was born in Tacoma in 1911. Sometime between 1911 and 1914 they moved to Alberta, Canada, where a daughter was born.

"They also homesteaded on 160 acres of land adjoining my father's quarter section." (Olaf Tveter's land in Tawatinaw, Alberta). "After some years he bought a farm near Clyde, Alberta, Canada. When they retired they moved to Edmonton, Alberta, to reside, where he died first and later she did. Helga was an energetic woman, a good worker on the farm, imbued with a good sense of humor." Their children are Toralph and Lilly. (From letter by Bennie J. Tweter) Trygve was born in Norway, and died in Alberta in 1959.

124 24 Olaf Gunerius b. March 23, 1890

d. Feb. 24, 1970

m. Freia Skarin b. ? d. 1961 m. Margaret b. ? d. 1969

Olaf also homesteaded near the Tveter clan in Tawatinaw, Alberta, Canada. He did not seem to care for farming so went to Edmonton and did carpenter work for a living. He survived both of his wives. He had five children and adopted one daughter. (B.J.T.)

124 25 Carl Peter b. Feb. 21, 1892 d. 1912
"He died when I was a little boy in Tacoma, Washington, I heard he became sick while in a logging camp and came home to die. It was said that he had tuberculosis." (B.J.T.)

124 26 Ragna b. 1895 d. 1951 m. Nathan Stromberg (Strøm-Berg)

Ragna was born near Oslo. Her father (Otto Tveter) owned a farm and a large store in Oslo. Ragna's son, Bennie, writes about his parents as follows:

"My mother often spoke of the beautiful farm in Norway where she grew up. Her father lost all his property due to signing notes for some friends. So the whole family immigrated to Canada to start anew. It seems that her father, Otto, may have become religious about this time. They settled in Alberta where my mother spent her young years. She and her sister, Ruth, often played guitar and sang in churches and became quite well known for it.

"My mother married a farmer - Nathan Stromberg and they resided near a town called New Norway in Alberta. Farming was not easy in those days. A dust storm could come and blow away the seed you had just planted, and I do remember during the Thirties the dune-like piles of dust along the roads. A hail storm could wipe out your crop in a few minutes if the drought or wind didn't get you first. I can remember the year the Army worms came through to eat anything green and another year when we were over run with millions of mice.

"My mother was very active in the New Norway Norwegian Lutheran Church. She was the organist for many years, as well as an active member in the local Ladies Aid. She was also instrumental in organizing the young people of the community to help keep them active and out of trouble. She was a lot of fun and often sponsored heavily attended parties for the local young peoples' religious groups. Later in life when she lived in Camrose she was also active in that Lutheran Church.

"She was also active in missionary organizations.

"Not only was farming a risky undertaking, but it also was often a dangerous one. When my parents first started farming they used horses. My father was twice kicked in the head by horses and my brother remembers the second time particularly well -- my father had lain unconscious for a month in the hospital. My mother was sitting beside him when he suddenly winked at her! That's when she knew he would be well.

"Two children born of this union -- Norman, born 1925, and Bennie, born in 1929.

"My mother died of cancer in 1951 at the age of 58. My father died in 1968."

124 27 Emil Ingvald b. 1897 d. 1957
Emil was footloose for many years, worked in various types of work, in logging camps, as a telephone lineman, in the harvest fields, etc. Late in life he married a widow in New Norway, Alberta, Canada. While in Edmonton he passed away in his sleep. He was always full of fun. He could have been good as an actor for he had a rare ability to impersonate the mannerisms of other people. (B.J.T.)

124 28 Ruth Borghild b. Feb. 7, 1899 d. Apr. 14, 1976 m. Andrew Kallevig b. ? d. 1963
Ruth was born in Norway, came to America, and married Andrew, who was from Vancouver, B.C. Ruth was very popular with the young

people. After her mother died she helped keep house for the family, until she went out to work as a housemaid, as cook and in a cookie factory. "She was very close to me. So many boxes of chocolates were given her by suitors that she sometimes sent some home to the farm for me. She was very active in her church in Morrin, where she was married to Andrew. They set up a home on a farm on the prairies. When I was 'born again' while working on Nathan Stromberg's farm in New Norway, I naturally wrote to her of my joy in the Savior's forgiveness of my sins. Then I met her at a Fair in Camrose, Alberta, Canada, where I again bubbled over with my joy in salvation. She proceeded to tell me of all her President of the Ladies Aid, teaching good works in her church: Sunday School class, singing in the choir, etc. I insisted that 'good works' and church membership could not save anyone from their sins. A few months later, while I was in Prairie Bible School at Three Hills, Alberta, she wrote to tell me of evangelistic meetings held in Morrin, and that she too had been wondrously saved. From that time she became one of my stalwart prayer warriors as I labored in the China mission field."

"I'll never forget the adventure we had together when she, Andrew, and my father drove over to Three Hills to take me to Morrin for a few days to visit with them. Going back we had to go down the cliffside that led to the Munson ferry. Dad and I sat in the back seat of the car. Suddenly I realized that something had gone wrong with the car, for we accelerated speed at an alarming rate down the grade and around curves. The car brakes had gone out on us! We were coming to a sharp curve, and at such a speed I knew we could never get around the bend, but would careen over the edge to a death about 400 feet below. No time for a long prayer, but I cried out, 'Lord, save us!' Truly God performed a miracle! Just a short distance from the edge of the cliff the car stopped dead . . . shaken, out of breath, we all got out and stared in amazement. There was nothing there to have stopped the car--no stones, no sand to bog down the wheels--just plain hard clay. I burst out in wonder to Andrew, 'Andrew, you were the driver, but the Lord stopped the car!! Andrew, who at the time had not yet come to our Lord and Savior, just stared and never uttered a word. Later as we sat in the house, out of a deep silence he spoke, 'Benny, do you think we could have made I replied that it would have been impossible at the that curve?' speed we were going. Andrew thoughtfully nodded his head in agreement. It is no wonder that later when I and others held evangelistic meetings in a country schoolhouse in Morrin that Andrew made profession of faith in Jesus Christ as his Savior! (Written by Bennie J. Tweter)

Ruth and Andrew had one daughter and two sons.

"Mother passed away suddenly in April 1975 from a stroke. Those who remember her will remember she was very quick and had a positive, jolly attitude. She said she always prayed that when her time came God would take her quickly, and her prayers were answered. The Pastor entitled his sermon that day "It is wonderful to be a Christian." We have good memories of her vibrant

Christian faith . . . now we of the next generation . . . will we leave those memories for our children?" (by Violet Kallevig Hoffman)

"My dad . . . Andrew Kallevig was born Dec. 28, 1887, at Norway Lake, Minnesota. His parents had come from Norway some time before that, their name being 'Kallevik' but I suppose changed to Kallevig to make it sound more Anglicized. Coming from a large family I presume he decided to reach out and try his luck elsewhere . . . namely homesteading in Canada.

"He received his citizenship papers on June 10, 1912, and his application for a homestead was approved by Ottawa June 12, 1913.

"His first house still remains on the home farm, was later turned into a chicken coop. He built a larger house when Ruth, my mom, came into his life. They were married in November 1919, leaving her home and father and brother Bennie behind in Tawatinaw, Alberta. A few years later Grandpa Tweter retired and came to live with us at Morrin until he passed away in 1937. Grandpa was a very quiet person. He was the one the boys ran to if they knew they were in for a spanking. He was the one that rocked and rocked them when they were babies and he was the one for whom we had to learn Norwegian, such as it was, but Grandpa understood it anyway. His hobby, it seemed, was cutting and stacking our wood so neatly, then being annoyed when he ran out We lived out on the 'bald prairie' so dad had to go in the coulee and scrounge for wood to keep him happy. He'd grumble to mom in Norwegian if he ran out of wood and say, "You'd think Andrew thought that wood was gold" when dad would caution him not to put in such long hours at it.

"Church and school were our main activities. . . ball and picnics in summer, skating and hockey and curling in the winter.

"When dad came out to 'homestead' the nearest town was a good 50 miles or more away, so it was not just 'around the corner' to go for that pound of coffee or bag of flour. He tells of one trip when he came home to find he had company camped beside him. They were just some Indians traveling through and tho' they meant no harm, I imagine it was a sleepless night for that young homesteader. From this marriage 3 children were born, Violet, Morris, and Donald, and in 1937 they added a second daughter through adoption who later passed away at the age of 16 years in Vancouver, B.C. where she had moved with her parents in 1944."

124 29 Trygve Martin b. Jan 20, 1901 d. May 4, 1974 m. Pearl Clark b. 1891

Trygve made local fame playing baseball, for they were both good pitchers and catchers and hard hitters at bat. They interchanged as pitcher and catcher. They lived in Edmonton, working for the railroad company until he retired. He came to an untimely death when he was hit by a car while on his way to a senior citizen's affair in the neighborhood. His wife died afterward. They had one daughter and three sons.

124 2(10) John Benny b. Nov. 25, 1905 m. Lucille Stokes

John Benny Tweter, born Nov. 25, 1905, in Stiles, Wisconsin. He had ambitions to become a writer and a cartoonist. He did some writing for the children's page for the newspaper Edmonton Journal while a boy on the farm. Later he took a cartoonist correspondence course, planning on its completion to go to the U.S.A. and start on some newspaper staff. God had other plans for him, for he was converted at age 21 while in New Norway, and went to the Prairie Bible School, and graduated from its 4-year course. After some evangelistic work under the auspices of the Canadian Sunday School Mission he went to China, where he served for 15 years. While there he married Lucille Stokes from Hastings, Minnesota. To them was born a daughter, Ruth Janet, on October 29, 1937.

When they came home to retire Benny served several churches: Mission Covenant Church in Mound, Minnesota; Fosston Baptist Church in Fosston, Minnesota; South Isanti Baptist Church in rural Isanti, Minnesota; then accepted the call to be the first resident pastor of a newly organized work in York, Nebraska, the Arbor Drive Baptist Church; presently serving the Calvary Baptist Church in Arcadia, Nebraska.

Since his return from China he has served on Conference Boards, been camp evangelist in Bible Camps, held evangelistic campaigns, withal writing for various religious periodicals.

Alfred was born in North Dakota. He immigrated with his parents to Canada in 1913. He attended school in Pauce Coupe and Valhalla Centre, Alberta, terminating his formal education when he finished the 8th grade. His first job was at a creamery at Valhalla Centre where he worked as a bottle washer. Later he worked at saw mills and became a steam engineer. For 21 winters he was a steam engineer at the mills and for eight summers he was relief steam engineer at Grande Prairie Hospital. He homesteaded in 1928 north of Valhalla Centre. He bought additional land later. Alfred is unmarried and farmed for many years. He recently sold his farm and retired in Hythe, a town nearby. He belonged to the National Farmers Union and is a Charter Member of South Peace Museum now situated at Beaverlodge. Alfred loved to take off fishing with his buddies, and if there is a stampede in the vicinity you will find him there looking on. The Pauce Coupe school which he and his brothers attended has been moved to the museum site at Dawson Creek, B.C.

His cousin, Violet Hoffman, writes: "I have seen Alfred about three times in my life . . . he is a colorful character . . . made us a good cup of coffee, cookies and ice cream and the whole bit.

In reminiscing about the olden days he indicated that he hasn't quite forgiven his parents yet for making him and his brothers get all dressed every Sunday for church which wouldn't have been so bad if only they could have put on their old clothes when they got home again and gone out to play . . . but no! . . . they had to stay dressed up and be prim and proper all day Sunday."

Stanley was born in Tacoma, Washington, and came to Canada with his parents two years later. He attended school at Pauce Coupe and Valhalla Centre where his parents had moved in 1923. Pastor Ronning, who was organizing a congregation in this little Norwegian settlement, was instrumental in getting Stanley's parents to move here, but Hans Tveter found land more to his liking at LaGlace, so the family moved again. After the father's death Stanley took over the farm and ran it until his death in 1970 which was due to a heart attack.

Stanley was interested in baseball. The little communities had their own teams and made their own fun since roads were few and travel was difficult. In later years he took up curling and brought home a number of trophies. He was active in the Farmers Union and served on the board of several local organizations.

Marie and Stanley were members of Calvary Lutheran Church at LaGlace. Marie is still active in that congregation.

From there I went to work for another customs broker in Vancouver, British Columbia. Getting nowhere in this I tried a number of other jobs, most notably in construction and a salt warehouse. That salt warehouse was a 'salt mine' for me!

"While doing this I was learning photography, and was eventually offered a job in New York with a commercial motion picture film maker. This was a very exciting and progressive place to work with the craziest boss you could imagine. They fired someone every day, but I managed to survive until the company got into financial trouble and I was offered a job with the motion picture film unit of the United Church of Christ, for whom I still work. During this period of time in New York I studied photography at the New York School of Fashion and at the New York Institute of Photography.

"I am also co-publisher of an Editorial Cartoon Magazine 'On The Line.' I married a registered nurse, Jacqueline Ouellet, in 1952, in Ottawa, Canada, while she was still in the Royal Canadian Air Force. To date her I used to drive up to Ottawa from New York for Saturday night—about a ten hour drive. On May 29, 1929, Victor's business was destroyed by flood and the family moved to Burlington, Washington, on July 3, 1929, where business did not go good so they moved to California where he had always wanted to go. He settled in Crescent City, California, just 20 miles south of Oregon, so he just barely made it to California. During the war years Crescent City was almost a ghost town, but it became home to the Swansons.

Victor was born in Pierre, South Dakota, and both he and Maylo died in Bremerton, Washington.

After the double ceremony, we four took off for North Dakota for our honeymoon. We planned to visit some of our aunts and uncles and while there experienced a severe snow and ice storm which downed many electric and telephone wires.

"The depression of the 30's hit hard in our locality the spring after we were married. We rented a farm house, and I took whatever work was to be had. Wages were as low as 50¢ a day. Eggs sold for 8 to 10 cents a dozen. The winter of 1931-32 was very hard, as there was no work to be had.

"By this time we were also expecting our first child. In February of 1932 we moved onto a small farm and I started hauling milk to the Freeport cheese factory. Freeport is a small village (much bigger now) near Decorah, Iowa. On March 8, 1932, our first child, a daughter, was born. We named her LaVerne Evelyn. On July 3, two years later, a second daughter, Marian Ethel, was born.

"In December of 1934 we moved to my parents' home and helped with the farming. I also continued to haul milk.

"I purchased a small filling station in October, 1935, and we moved to Ostrander, Minnesota. We had been there just a week when mother passed away. Then on March 6, 1937, twin sons were born. We called these boys Roger Arnold and Ronald Dean. They were very premature, and Ronald passed away a few hours after birth.

"The two winters we spent in Ostrander were so bad at times there was no traffic at all. There were many blizzards which lasted as much as three days at a time. At one time there was no train service for a week.

"In October of 1937 we decided to return to Decorah. The next spring we again moved into a farm house. I, again, started to haul milk to the Freeport cheese factory. The next year we rented a farm. It was small, but gave me a start in farming again and along with this I continued to haul milk.

"December 7, 1941, Pearl Harbor was bombed and the United States was at war. About a year later, on November 12, 1942 (our 12th wedding anniversary) we moved to a larger farm and I quit hauling milk. While we lived on this farm another son, Wesley Ernest, was born on December 13, 1945.

"In 1947 I purchased my father's farm and moved there in late February, 1948. My father stayed with us a lot. He also spent some time with the other children, but always returned to us. At the age of 86 he broke his hip. After getting out of the hospital, he lived in different homes of his children who cared for him. A few years later he had a stroke and spent much of his last years in bed. He died on January 5, 1956, at the age of 91.

"We continued living on the home place until the fall of 1968 when we sold the farm and purchased a home in Decorah at 506 Vernon Street. I work for the Aase Haugen Homes, Inc., as a custodian for the Decorah Retirement Center and have been there for 10 years.

"We participate in church activities, and I have served on the Church Council. We enjoy fishing."

LaVerne was born in Winneshiek County, Iowa. When she was less than three years old her family moved to Ostrander, Minn. It was there she started school. The family moved from there in November 1937 to Decorah, Iowa, and LaVerne was transferred to West Side School in Decorah. In March of 1938 they moved to a farm near the Upper Dam in Glenwood Township east of Decorah where LaVerne went to Glenwood District 8 School, also known as Lakeview School.

In 1942 the family moved again and she went to District #2 or the Drake School, where she graduated from eighth grade in May of 1946. Graduation exercises for all eighth graders in Winneshiek County rural schools were held in the J.C.K. Preus Gymnasium at Luther College. (This structure was destroyed by fire in 1950.) LaVerne writes as follows:

"That fall (1946) I started to Decorah High School. During that year the War, as we talked of it, ended and with it the end of rationing and other things that had made life a little different. That war did not affect my life much, as I was too young and with my dad a farmer he did not have to enter the service. I enjoyed my high school years and found them passing all too fast. I managed to take part in a few of the activities but my talents did not fall in the music department or sports nor was I very good at speaking.

"After graduating in 1950 I worked as a mother's help for Mrs. Bernard Howland, whose husband was a chiropractor. Later I found a position as secretary-typist at Anundsen Publishing Co. (publishers of Decorah Posten)

"On Palm Sunday, April 6, 1952, Raymond Ramsey and I were married at the home of my parents. (It was the house my grand-parents, Hans and Carrie Brynsaas, built.) I continued working until September of that year. Raymond, son of Gilbert and Olga Ramsey, worked for L. C. Bolson Co. He is still with them.

"Our first child, Rosalyn Louise, was born by Caeserian section on February 9, 1953. The others followed in quick succession (all Caeserian). Ronald Dean on March 15, 1954; Beverly Lynn on February 14, 1956 (also her grandmother Brynsaas' birthday) and finally David Alan on October 22, 1957. By this time we had purchased our home on Iowa Avenue in West Decorah.

"In 1958 we changed our church membership from Decorah Lutheran to Good Shepherd Lutheran (a new congregation) which was closer to our home. There we participated in various church activities, the children going to Sunday School and Bible School. They were all confirmed at this church. I became a member of the ALCW and a circle. I also taught Bible School for three summers and was a member of the Altar Guild. Raymond did some ushering and also sang with the choir.

"As the children grew up and entered school, expenses became greater and I had to find a job outside the home. My first full-time job was as Nursing Aide at the Decorah Retirement Center. In 1970 I was given a job at Luther College, eventually working in the Alumni Office.

"As for my paternal grandparents, I can't say very much as my grandmother died right after we moved to Ostrander, Minnesota. After we moved back I do remember Grandpa coming to visit, usually a day or two at a time. I don't recall him ever telling us stories of his boyhood or when dad was growing up. But I do recall him giving us candy from a bag of peppermint lozenges he carried in his pocket. (I wonder if any of his other grandchildren remember him for that?) As we moved to larger houses he was able to stay for longer periods of time. We usually enjoyed and looked forward to his visits. He made no demands on the grandchildren, never correcting our faults that I remember or any of the other things that some grandparents do. And, of course, Mom had the care of him at the time he died and she can probably tell many more things about living with them.

"My great-grandparents I don't remember at all, though I know that great-grandpa Erickson died sometime after I was born as I have a snapshot of him with three great-grandchildren with him, of which I am one."

The following is Marian's account of her life's history:

"I was baptized in Decorah Lutheran Church.

"As I began to grow I developed a quiet personality, although I had a tendency for getting into mischief.

"We moved to Ostrander, Minnesota, when I was about a year old. We first lived in an upstairs apartment and then moved into a bungalow. One fall day Mom was going to wash pillow covers. She had emptied the feathers into a tub and set them in the sun to air out. Suddenly Mom heard me squealing gleefully and coming to see what I was doing discovered me tossing the feathers in the air and squealing 'Whee-e-e! it's raining.'

"Shortly after this we moved back to Decorah. The following spring we moved to a farm near the Upper Dam in Glenwood Township. From there I eventually started school in the Lakeview School (District #8). School days were uneventful. I enjoyed reading and other subjects, but I never did like to play ball or other games.

"We moved to another farm when I was 8, and I attended school at District #2 or Drake School, as it was called.

"When I was in 8th grade we moved to Dad's home place. I graduated from 8th grade while attending the Baker School (District #3). From there I started to high school in Decorah. LaVerne and I shared a room in town. The year I was a senior the school bus started going by our farm, so I stayed home and rode the bus back and forth. I was confirmed in Decorah Lutheran Church, June 5, 1948.

"High school was very uneventful except for one phy. ed. period. It was spring and we were warming up to play softball. A cousin was in my class and we were supposed to be tossing the ball back and forth. As usual, I wasn't paying much attention when she tossed the ball towards me. Not seeing the ball coming, I didn't duck and WHAM-O, right in the face. Result - a broken nose! Me!! who had never had a broken bone in my life.

"Graduation from high school was June 1, 1952. Right after the county fair, in August, I started working for the L. C. Bolson Co. in the office. I roomed with my sister and her husband.

"I learned to drive a car through Adult Driver's Ed. and was able to transport myself to the country on weekends and spent the summers there, driving back and forth to work. Later when the folks moved into town I moved into their house as well.

"I now teach Sunday School 12 weeks every year, attend circle meetings, etc. To help keep me busy I do some fancy work, such as embroidery and crocheting. I do quite a bit of reading, and I like to travel.

"I still work for the L. C. Bolson Co. (1978)"

Roger Brynsaas writes as follows:

"I was born in Ostrander, Minnesota, on March 6, 1937, the older of identical twins. My brother, Ronald Dean, died a few hours after he was born. Before I was a year old we moved back to Decorah and then to a farm near what was known as the Upper Iowa Dam. Later we moved to what was known as the Bleka Farm. There I learned to work with Dad on the farm. I started school in the Drake School or Glenwood, District #2.

"At the age of 11 we moved to Dad's home place, the Brynsaas estate, now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Austin Newcombe. While living there I attended the Baker school and graduated from 8th grade. I also helped dad and some of the neighbors with farm work.

"I moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where I worked at Henderson Manufacturing Plant for a year and a half. In April 1957 I enlisted in the U.S. Navy as a Seaman Recruit.

"I made Fireman Apprentice in July of that year and graduated from recruit training. From there I attended machinery repairman class 'A' school from July through October, then in October of 1957, I was made Machinery Repairman Fireman. During my first years in the Navy I served on board the USS Prairie AD-15 (Oct. 1957) and USS Dixie AD-14, home ported at San Diego, Calif.

While on the USS Prairie, I was made Machinery Repairman, third class. This was in December of 1958. Then on the Dixie I received the Machinery Repairman second class in May of 1960. My travels took me to ports in the Philippines, Japan, Hong Kong, Okinawa, Taiwan, and Wake Island.

"Next I was stationed on the east coast and on the USS McCaffery DD-860. It was on this ship that I made Machinery Repairman first class in November 1962. I made two cruises to the Mediterranean, visiting Spain, France, Italy, Greece, Turkey, Jordan, Sudan, Aden, Berian & Massawa. One cruise was made to Northern Europe visiting Germany (transiting the Kiel Canal), Sweden and Holland. During these cruises I also transited (passed through) the Suez Canal. We also visited Bermuda and Puerto Rico in the Carribean. I was also in the Cuban Blockade in the fall of 1962.

"I was married April 19, 1963 to Beatrice Wellman, a native of Michigan. The wedding took place in the Navy chapel at Mayport, Florida. We lived first at Jacksonville Beach, Florida. In December 1964 we moved to Millington, Tenn., while I was stationed at the naval air station in Memphis. From there we moved to New Orleans, Louisiana, where I served aboard the USS Satyr ARL-23. This was in August of 1967.

"In March, 1968 we left New Orleans for San Diego transiting the Panama Canal. Traveling to Viet Nam for the first time in June 1968 we sailed to the Mekong Delta. It was on this trip that I received my final rating of Chief Machinery Repairman in October, 1968. Leaving the ship in Viet Nam, I flew back to the base in San Diego in February, 1969.

"My next ship was the USS Bryce Canyon AD-36 (ported in Long Beach), where I was for three months. The USS Isle Royale AD-29, also stationed at Long Beach was next. I spent two years there, and Bea and I had our mobile home at Huntington Beach.

"From there I was transferred to Detroit, Michigan, where I served as Navy recruiter. We lived in Adrian, Michigan from March 1971 to March 1972.

"Moving back to the west coast, we lived in Vallejo, Calif. I was transferred to the USS Ranger CVA-61 home ported at Alameda, California. We made a cruise to Viet Nam in November of 1972 just prior to the final bombing before the U.S. withdrew. I visited Singapore and crossed the equator on this cruise. As we crossed the equator, I was one of those who were initiated a Shellback (this is for the ones who were crossing the equator for the first time.) We returned from that cruise in August 1973.

"We moved from Vallejo south to Imperial Beach in September 1973. Bea died there in January 1974 and I was transferred from the Ranger to the USS Prairie AD-15. She was home ported in San Diego and I was transferred in May 1974. This was my first ship and would be the one I retired from. We made a final cruise in

January of 1975 and returned in August 1975. Most of our time was spent in the Philippines. We were there during the evacuation of Viet Nam.

"I was retired from the Navy on March 19, 1976, and have been traveling through the United States since."

Wesley tells his story as follows:

"It was the winter of 1945 and Second World War was just over. On Thanksgiving Day Mom, Dad, and the rest of the family were invited into town for dinner. Because of the difficult driveway to our farm home, it had been decided Mom would stay in town until I was born. The night of December 13 I finally made my appearance. On January 13, 1946, I was baptized in the Decorah Lutheran Church.

"Living on the farm was a good life, but it soon was discovered I wasn't quite like the others. I developed an allergy to milk and for quite a while had to have a special formula. Gradually I was able to eat other foods.

"We moved to another farm while I was a toddler. Grandpa stayed with us quite a bit of the time, and we enjoyed each other's company. By this time I was having a problem with asthma, which caused me to miss school often. I did well in my subjects, however, and graduated from 8th grade. I had been attending Baker School, the same one my dad attended, going on to the Decorah High School. I joined the FFA (Future Farmers of America Club). I graduated in the spring of 1965.

"My first full-time job was with Deco Products of Decorah.

Later I joined the Navy and had my training in California. After
my discharge I returned to Decorah and went back to work at Deco.

"About a week after returning to work I was involved in a one-car smashup. I was badly injured and fortunate to be alive. I spent several months in the hospital in Iowa City. At one point I was returned to intensive care where a fight was made for my life.

"Later, after my strength came back, I moved to Cedar Rapids with some buddies and got a job there with Weyerhaeuser Company - Shipping Container Division.

"I started going with a girl from Mabel, Minnesota. She was Susan Rouster, who graduated from Mabel-Canton High School, and shortly before we were to be married, I was in another car accident. This time I wasn't in the hospital for such a long time, but my leg was in a cast again (It will never be the same) and my jaw was wired shut again.

"Susan and I were married in the Catholic Church in Mabel.
My leg was still in a cast. This was a Saturday (a beautiful day)
the 12th of April, 1969. After a short honeymoon I moved back to
Cedar Rapids and Sue stayed at home to help until her little sister
was born in May. We lived in Cedar Rapids.

"Sue started taking instructions in the Lutheran Church, and I served the church by being an usher. While in Cedar Rapids, we had two daughters. Both girls were baptized in Trinity Lutheran Church of Cedar Rapids.

"I decided I should try Deco again, so we moved back to Decorah. We found a farm house to rent. We both went to work for Deco, leaving the girls with one of the neighbors.

"We joined Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Decorah, eventually becoming active in Sunday School, etc. I was elected to the Decorah Cemetery Board and served on the church council. I also serve as an usher. Sue helped teach vacation church school.

"We wanted to be in the Decorah School District when Tlisa started school, so we found a mobile home for rent a short distance from town.

"In 1974 we had another daughter. She was baptized in the Good Shepherd Church. Sue did babysitting to help out, and I changed jobs, going to work for A. Y. McDonald, a plumbing wholesaler, where I am still working.

"I joined the local I.O.O.F. Lodge and became active there. I also have been active in a bowling league."

"I was born on October 2, 1916, on the Brynsaas farm in Glenwood Township east of Decorah, Iowa, son of Hans and Karren Brynsaas, where I spent all of my boyhood days and attended the county grade school. Each summer I attended three or four weeks of Norwegian Parochial school which was provided by the Glenwood Lutheran Church. Oscar P. Lovstuen was the teacher. In April of 1931 I was confirmed in the Glenwood Lutheran Church in the Norwegian language which was still used there at that time.

"During my early days I also experienced the depression when prices were very low, both wages and farm prices. When I was 15 years old I helped with the daily farm work at a neighboring farm for 25 cents a day. A grown man worked long, hard days to earn 50 cents a day. Hogs brought \$1.50 per hundred weight, so a nice hog would bring about \$3.00. I can remember our neighbor had a cow they planned to sell but they were offered 1/2 cent per pound so decided not to sell the cow but butchered it for their meat instead, which was very common in those days, and they also shared this meat with their neighbors. Cream was selling 10 to 20 cents per pound butterfat, eggs were from 6 to 10 cents per dozen. At that time you could buy gas for your car for 15 or 20 cents per gallon, and also buy a new tire for about \$3.00.

"As my older brothers, Henry and Edwin, married and left home I was expected to stay on the farm and help with the farming, and also to help drive the car for my folks. I started driving at the age of 14, and in 1934 I bought my first car, a 1925 Model T Ford Roadster and this cost \$45.00.

"My mother died in October of 1935, so my Dad and I stayed on the farm. On August 18, 1937, I married Mae Rasmussen and we farmed the home farm and my Dad lived with us. We have two children, Nancy was born on August 19, 1938, and Robert was born on February 16, 1941. Then in 1943 we moved to a farm on Highway 9. There we had electric lights and paved roads, so we thought that was really great. Two years later we moved again to a larger farm in Pleasant Township and farmed until 1953 when we had a farm sale and moved to Decorah.

"I worked two years as a carpenter's helper, then accepted a job as a cabinet maker at the Calmar Manufacturing Co., in Calmar, Iowa, and worked there for eight years. At this time we built our house on Pershing Avenue in Decorah, where we are still living. In 1963 I began work as caretaker of the Decorah Retirement Center and later became Maintenance Supervisor of the building. After working there about fifteen years, I felt that I would like to start building cabinets and some furniture for people in and around Decorah, so I am now self employed doing carpenter work, also installing carpets for Sherwin Williams Paint Store of which my son, Robert, is manager. I also sand floors.

"We also like to travel, and have taken two trips to Norway, the first one in 1967 and again in 1971. In 1969 we took a trip to Jamaica on the ship 'Starword' along with our best friends,

the Erling Innviks of Norway, who were living in Decorah at that time. We have also traveled by airplane to Mexico, Arizona, California, and Washington, D.C., but each time have been thankful to come back to Iowa, the best place of all."

Nancy writes about herself and her family as follows:

"I had the most wonderful parents any child could have, Norman and Mae Brynsaas. I was raised on the farm and loved all the animals, except the stinky pigs. When I was a sophomore in high school we moved from the farm into Decorah. It was really great to be living in town. That year I met up with my grade school boyfriend, Wm. (Bill) Spilde and we dated through high school. In my senior year I worked for Blanche McArthur.

"In 1956 I graduated from high school and continued to work for Blanche through the summer. In the fall I started a new job at the ASC Office in Decorah. I worked there for four years and continued dating Bill. We were married August 24, 1958. He was a dairyman at the Winneshiek County Farm, and we moved into a cute little house there at the farm and we loved it. In October 1960 our first daughter, Luann, was born and I quit work to raise a family. In June 1962 our second child was born, a boy, Mark. In the fall of 1963 we decided the County Farm was no place to raise children, so Bill got a job at the K & S Super Valu Store, which was a brand new grocery store. He started out with \$80 a week and we bought a new 3-bedroom home near K & S. I started babysitting for children whose mothers worked. In October 1965 our third son, Steve, was born. Then in April of 1968 tragedy hit our family. Bill's brother, Fritz Leonhardt, and his wife were killed in a car accident and left two children. In November we acquired custody of these two children, Deana, age 2, and

Daniel, age 1. Because our family had grown with the addition of these two, we needed more room, so we added a large addition to our house. To our surprise, in February of 1974 our fourth child, a girl, Lisa Mae, was born. As of 1978, Bill is produce manager at Jack & Jill Food Market. I'm still a homemaker but do work a couple of hours a day decorating cakes at a bakery. We have six children, Luann, 17; Mark, 15; Steve, 12; Deana, 11; Danny, 10; and Lisa Mae, 4. And God has been very good to us."

Drexel was born in Leonard, North Dakota, and writes that his earliest recollections are of that town and of his father's print shop burning, of moving to LaBolt where his father and uncle had the Willow Brook Stock Farm for a short time, and of moving to Cawker City, Kansas, where he began his education in the first grade and skipping to second grade at the second semester. 1925 brother, Kirby, started first grade and Drexel third grade in Ottawa where the family had moved. That summer they came to Decorah to visit. "I remember the home place quite well, and Norman and Nina, the creek and the crowdads and the nightmares they generated, a big collie dog, and a blind mare. I remember rotten egg fights (they buried my clothes) and mites in my hair from the chicken house. I remember going to the Little Brown Church in the Wildwood, and Dad getting lost on the Skyline Road in the Model-T, and mother screaming that we couldn't turn around there." He moved with his parents to Summit, South Dakota, and then to Martin, South Dakota. At one time he recalls living across the street from Sitting Bull's daughter, who was in her sixties then. "I remember seeing teepees in the morning that were not there the night before and were gone in the night later." The family moved next to Marmarth, North Dakota. They started out on Valentine's Day in a truck loaded with everything, even the dog." We made it only as far as Minot due to the snow drifts. We nearly froze to death for four hours waiting for the late train to come so we could take it to Marmarth, another Railroad town with a Roundhouse. That summer (at Marmarth) was memorable from prairie towns to hikes up and down the Little Missouri and Beaver Creek to picking goosebeeries, chokecherries, fishing, and frog hunting, and finding quick sand.

July 3, 1929, the family moved to Burlington, Washington, by way of the Great Northern Railroad, through Glacier National Park, following the Yellowstone River for miles. They stopped enroute to visit Aunt Hilda Prinzing at Great Falls, where there was a grasshopper plague and the only creatures who were happy were the chickens who laid green-yolked eggs.

When the family got settled in Burlington, they were not far from Aunt Julia Kjelso's home in Edmond. "Mother and Aunt Julia traded kids from time to time that summer and we all had fun. We ran wild, and ate delicious applies, cherries, black berries, pears, and plums."

When they moved to Crescent City, "Dad sent for us in July of 1930. We spent July 4th on the road, a disaster for kids who couldn't set off their firecrackers. July 5th we set up house-keeping in a hotel right on the beach. Again we kids went wild, playing in the waves and tidal pools and fishing off the docks. Here was home! We settled in and did the usual things. In Boy Scouting we brushed a trail to Boy Scout Tree, a redwood 33½ feet around. I went to high school, had my first car and my first girl who turned out to be the first and last after a courtship of four years. Betty and I were married October 27, 1940. She is German-Scotch-Irish. I worked in saw mills in Oregon, and Betty got her first telephone company experience. She recently retired from General Telephone Co., where she has been manager of the business office here."

"In 1943 we moved to Kingston, Washington, and both worked in the torpedo station at Keyport, just out of Bremerton. The day the war ended we packed up for Crescent City again. We found no place to live. I wanted to build my own home and found I knew exactly nothing about it, so I asked a building contractor for a job and I've been at it ever since. I had my own home by 1952 built in two year's spare time. Now I do remodeling and additions mostly. Last year I finished two apartments over my 25 x 50 shop.

"We became deeply involved in square dancing from 1949 to 1961, teaching the last six years. I handled the square dancing and pattern dancing while Betty did the ballroom and folk dancing. She also taught in the schools all over the county. She also was recreation director for a couple of years, then went to managing Six Rivers Savings and Loan, then to the Telephone Co.

"From dancing we went to playing duplicate bridge. To those interested, we have played in Nationals in Portland, Oregon, three times, also San Francisco and Las Vegas. We've played in many Regionals in Oregon and Northern California. I just got back from the Mexico City Bridge Nationals. I spent eight days in Mexico and had a fantastic time, bullfights and all.

"In 1964 on Good Friday when the Alaskan earthquake caused tidal waves which demolished downtown Crescent City, the waters came within two blocks of where we now live and up four blocks into town. Crescent City is known as 'Come-Back Town'."

Byron, known as Barney, was born at Seaside Hospital, Crescent City, California, just three weeks after Pearl Harbor. The Emidio had just been torpedoed off shore. The wreckage could be seen from the hospital. It came in on a rock by a light house and was broken in two in a storm. The bow drifted around the jetty into the harbor and fell over in the bay the day before Christmas. They all had full gas tanks and evacuation routes in case of attack. The only bombing of the U.S. Mainland was done just north of Crescent City by a plane from off a sub with fire bombs trying to set the forest afire at Brookings. Oregon.

Barney is a qualitative engineer at a particle board plant. He spent nearly five years in the Navy. They kept him in during and after the "Bay of Pigs" incident in Cuba. He learned radar, some electronics, and scuba diving. He is an avid hunter, fisherman, and backpacker. He has a 4" gold dredge and drives a Jeep Cherokee.

He and his dad have a 22-foot commercial fishing boat they play around with during the summer. They fish for Silver and King Salmon, snappers, cod, and turkey rock. Summer of 1977 while out one day they found themselves nearly surrounded by basking sharks --36 of them somewhere around 35 feet long and weighing 8 ton.

Their best catches were 38 salmon one day and 1,380 lbs. of bottom fish another day.

Byron's wife is French-Canadian. She was born at Fort Dick, California. They were married July 11, 1964. They have two children.

Lyle was born in 1937 on his mother's birthday in Crescent City, California, where he spent the first 5½ to 6 years of his life. He started school at Crescent City. Mid-year he and his sister moved to Seattle and spent the second half of the year living and going to school with their cousins, the Kjolsos. He and his sister, Barbara, then moved to Ashland, Oregon, where Barbara finished high school, met her husband, and was married. Lyle writes, "I remember we lived in a small apartment right across the street from my school. My sister's life and mine remained I moved with her and her new husband to Poulsbo, Washington, where we lived in one of the project houses built to house the many people who came to work in the Navy Yard at Bremerton during the war years. Here I attended 4th grade. Next we moved to Bremerton to be closer to my brother-in-law's job. had begun an apprenticeship at the Naval Shipyard there. I went through 5th grade and on to graduate from high school. After graduating I moved to Seattle, Washington, where I live with my parents. It is sad, but inevitable that my Mother and I were not too close. She had spent six years in a State Hospital in Mendocino, California, during my formative years $(2\frac{1}{2} \text{ to } 8\frac{1}{2})$. While she lived with father in Seattle, I stayed on with my sister and her family across Puget Sound at Bremerton. I visited quite often on weekends, but it was not the same as living with my parents.

"I worked at my brother's service station from June 1954 until March 1955 when I joined the Army. I was sent to Fort Ord, California, for basic training, then to Fort Devens, Mass., for processing, and then to Language School at Presidio of Monterey, California. I was in the Army Security Agency and am still not at liberty to divulge my duties. After 6 months concentrated course in the German language, I spent about 2½ years of overseas service most of the time in Berlin. I came first to Frankfurt a/Main, Germany, the day after my 19th birthday. After six months I was transferred to Berlin, 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain. I enjoyed my time in Germany and though travel was restricted, I was able to see some of Europe while I was there. My tour of duty would have been completed in March of 1958. However, the World's Fair in Brussels was due to begin in April of that year. Not wanting to miss the opportunity of seeing my first World's Fair, I voluntarily extended my service time by six months. Taking two weeks leave, I toured Amsterdam, Holland, then spent 3 or 4 days in Brussels. I was discharged in September of 1958 at Fort Lewis and stayed with my parents while looking for a job."

Lyle's work experience has been varied. During 1949, 1950, and 1951, he went for the summers to work for his brother, Dean, at Crescent city, who was delivering dairy products between Crescent City, California, and Brookings, Oregon. Lyle helped bringing in orders of milk, butter, cheese, etc., to stores and restaurants

and lugging out cases of empty milk bottles. In 1952 Dean switched to delivering bread along the same route and Lyle assisted that Between his junior and senior year he began working for his brother, Kirby, who owned a gas station at Northgate, north of Seattle. He commuted from Bremerton on Friday nights, staying with his folks, working at the station on Saturdays, and perhaps Sunday mornings. In the afternoon he would catch a ferry back to Bremerton and prepare for school the next morning. After his tour in Europe he found work with Boeing and worked the swing shift for six months at the Renton Plant where he installed electrical cableways on the KC-135 jet tankers. Boeings' contract was up in March of 1959 and Lyle was laid off. He "kicked around" town for 6 or 7 months, drawing rocking-chair wages, exercising at the Y, drinking gallons of coffee. He took a trip with his folks and his sister and her family, eight in a station wagon with about 500 pounds of camping gear and clothes in a cartop carrier for a two-week trip to Idaho, Montana, North and South Dakota, to visit relatives and sight see. In the fall of 1959 Lyle went to work for Sweden Freeze Manufacturing Co., which made soft ice cream machines. Usually a batch of ice cream was made to test out the machine and everyone joined in to sample the results. When this job was terminated, Lyle soon got a call to report to the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard where he had taken an apprenticeship exam. He started as apprentice ship fitter. program consisted of 4 years schooling and on-the-job training. He graduated as a full-fledged journeyman and had ample opportunity to try out his skills as he worked in the shippard where they built destroyers, sub-tenders, destroyer-tenders, and supply ships. He also worked on several ships that come in for over-haul or con-One such ship was the U.S.S. Pueblo, now being held by the Gradually the yards shifted from a construction North Koreans. yard to a submarine overhaul yard and Lyle has worked several years on various nuclear powered submarines. Carl was born in Winneshiek County, Iowa. As a young man he moved to South Dakota in about 1911. He came with the John Buer family. He spent the winter and returned to Decorah. Later he and his brother Gilmer came to South Dakota and each filed on homesteads. He lived for years in his prairie shack. After years of drought, Carl decided to sell all his belongings and work in the Homestake Mine in Lead, South Dakota, only to find after disposing of his property that he was too old to work in the mine. He found employment as a farm hand on a large cattle ranch. In 1936 he accompanied the Gilmer Bolson family on a trip to Iowa to visit Grandpa Bolson who had become seriously ill. He never married. His sister, Emma, helped with his housekeeping until she married. In 1938 he moved to Oregon and found work in the timber at Kenzua. He retired from this work and bought a chicken farm in Hermiston, Oregon, about 20 miles from Boardman, Oregon, and lived there until he passed away. His hobby was reading. He spent many lonely hours reading books and magazines during the pre-TV era.

Emma was born on the home farm in Glenwood Township, Winneshiek

County, Iowa. She went to rural school. She came to Decorah to work as a house maid, then as a cook at Luther College. About 1913 she went with her cousin, Josephine Buer, out to take a claim in South Dakota. Both young women had brothers who had preceded them into the Wild West. There Emma met and married Gordon, more commonly called "Gordie."

Gordon was a freight hauler and drove the freight line to Baker, Montana. He experienced lots of rigorous weather on his job. Once he had great difficulty getting through the snow drifts but on his way back he found the hundred mile an hour wind had swept the roads clean.

Emma had many adventures in the west. Once she awakened to pounding on the side of her shack. An Indian was out there hitting the building. The Indians would come begging for milk for "sick papoose."

She once found a rattlesnake in the cellar, pinned it down with a forked stick, and snapped its head off. Once she was ironing in the kitchen and looked up and saw a white-faced cow looking in at her. Emma would ride over to do housekeeping for her brother, Carl, who had a homestead shack near by. Once on one of her trips to Carl's her horse was frightened by a rattlesnake, so she got off, got a stick, and killed it.

Carl bought Emma's section of land. The shack was covered with imitation brick.

In the early 1920s Emma and Gordie gave up the rigors of life on the prairie and moved to Decorah, Iowa. They made the trek in an old pickup with their three little children, tenting along the way. It took eleven days to make the trip, and one of the little girls said upon getting out of their vehicle when they reached Decorah, "I don't want to go bye-bye any more!"

They lived with Grandpa Bolson awhile, moved to Decorah where Gordie did painting, then moved to Calmar, Iowa, and later to Cedar Rapids. After a number of years there, they went to Delhi, where they lived until they passed away.

DESCENDANTS OF EMMA (BOLSON) AND GORDON WHITMORE

Ellen was born at Baker, Montana, and when she was six weeks old the family moved to her mother's homestead in South Dakota. Her folks tried farming, but summers were too hot and dry. Very little grew and winters were hard and cold. There were plenty of rattle snakes, lizzards, and cactus on the homestead. Ellen writes, "When I was a year and a half old I fell in a cactus patch. The folks said they picked cactus out of me for a whole day. Lora and Irma, my

two sisters, were born in Dakota too. Irma had been born in May of 1921, and in October of that same year we left for Iowa. I have only a vague recollection of the trip and our life in Dakota since I was only $4\frac{1}{2}$ when we left. The weather must have been nice, as we came back in an open, one-seated Model-T Ford, with a box built on the back. This held whatever belongings we could pack into it. The trip took ten days. A tent was put up every night, meals were cooked over an open fire. I remember that some horses walked around our tent one night. I do recall our arrival at Decorah and driving up to the John Buer home. In all the commotion of unpacking a few things Lora, who was a little past two, disappeared. She was found near the Albert Stevens home down the street a ways. Emily Stevens saw her and wondered where that little Indian girl had come from. She had gotten so dark skinned from the trip she could well have passed as an Indian.

"Our whole family has many happy memories of time spent with Grandpa (Anton) and Grandma (Anne) Bolson. There were always many goodies on hand to eat—cookies, cake, plum jam, summer sausage, dried beef, cheese, and chocolate cream drops. Few were the times when Grandma's house wasn't overflowing with aunts and uncles and cousins. With all of the youngsters around, we had a barrel of fun. Sometimes this fun wasn't up to par; for example, when we chased the chickens until they would fall over, throwing the cats in the rain water tank to see if they could swim, throwing handsful of oats or corn out to the chickens so we could catch them by the tail as they came to eat. Of course, we weren't always doing bad things.

The 4th of July was always gooseberry picking time. We'd go to Grandma's the night before. After breakfast next morning a lunch was packed and it was off to the berry bushes. It seemed that it took us days to pick them all. To keep us at the job at all, we would get a penny a quart when the job was done.

"One third of July prior to our berry picking task, Lora had the end of her finger taken off in the pump. The handle was down. She and I were going to fix it. I held the handle up, she was to put the bolt in. I didn't know she had her finger in the hole instead of the bolt. Down went the handle! Off went the finger!

"Dad became a painter and paper hanger after moving to Decorah. A few years later we moved to Calmar, Iowa. Dad painted the courthouse steeple in Decorah and several church steeples around the country.

"Our family grew. There were eight children and with a family like this to raise during the depression years, much gardening and canning was done. We all had a hand in the work. By fall hundreds of quarts of canned food was put away with bins of potatoes which always saw us through the winters.

"As time passed, one by one we were married and had our own families.

"My husband, Frank and I, worked a number of years at the Wilson Processing Plant. We now live at Delhi, Iowa."

Lora writes, "I met Robert when I was 17, on October 4, 1936. I still had a year to finish in high school. Robert was working at Marsh Music Store in Decorah while continuing his education by correspondence course. It was the height of the depression and the future looked dim. Through the next four years we struggled to get our feet on solid ground. Robert finished his studies and went to Chicago to do his lab work. I spent most of my time taking care of sick relatives and helping with new babies.

"In December of 1940 while we were planning our wedding, I slipped and fell on some ice and broke an ankle. We decided to continue our plans, and we were married by the light of the Christmas tree in my home on December 31, 1940. Robert and his family were late for the wedding because the roads were covered with ice.

"Six weeks later we went to Chicago with no job and only a hundred dollars between us. In two days Robert had been placed in a job through the school he had attended. Pay was small, but the cost of living was low. I remember spending \$3 for groceries and having enough money left so I could hire a boy to haul them home for me in his wagon for a cost of 5¢.

"On January 7, 1943, Norma Kay was born during one of Chicago's great snow storms. We couldn't get out, so they brought doctors in on a snow plow and they used the kitchen table for the delivery. A few weeks later Robert had to leave for service in World War II. We got \$50 a month for allotment and \$10 extra for one child. I moved to a Government Housing project. It seemed forever for those of us who waited, but the war finally came to the end and Robert returned a nervous wreck. His gentle disposition had not adjusted easily to war. A year later our daughter, Suzanne, was born.

But, the small crops we had put in sustained us along with the help of God and many friends and relatives. By early fall Robert had a job in the Electrical Engineering Dept. of Youngstown Sheet and Tube Co., where he still works, although he is fast approaching retirement.

"Here on this little farm in Indiana we raised our children and enjoyed the great out-of-doors. Robert drove back and forth to the steel mills each day. When the children were grown and driving

so far became a burden, we moved closer to Robert's work to the Smoky City of East Chicago, where we still live. It is home to us and we have become accustomed to its dirt and grime.

"Since the children were gone, we had more freedom. We spent our vacations in traveling. We have been from coast to coast, from Keys of Florida to Northern Canada and last spring we flew to Mexico City and found a whole different world. I can only say, despite all the struggles, 'What a wonderful World the Great God has created for us. '"

marriage Helen was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran Church. Carl and Gilmer both farmed and had beef cattle. Carl remained a bachelor and lived alone. After years of drought, Carl decided to sell all of his belongings and work in the Homestake mine in Lead, South Dakota, only to find, after disposing of his property, that he was too old to work in the mine. He found employment as a farm hand on a large cattle ranch.

One traumatic event the family experienced occurred on a visit to the Buers, who had just installed natural gas in their home. After dinner the house became very warm. When Teddy Buer went to check the furnace, it exploded, demolishing the house. Those present, Teddy, Rae, and Glendon Buer, Helen, Gilmer, Opal, and Art Bolson, all escaped without injury. The house was completely destroyed by fire after the explosion in a matter of minutes.

Gilmer never returned to Decorah to visit his parents and family until 1929. In 1936 the whole family came back to Iowa when Grandpa Bolson (Anton) became seriously ill. In 1937 the family moved to Oregon in their 1929 Essex taking with them only what they could carry in the car. Gilmer found work in Oregon felling timber.

At the beginning of World War II Gilmer and Art found work in the Portland Shipyards. Art joined the Navy early in World War II. Helen and Gilmer lived in Portland until 1944 when they moved to Boardman, Oregon, where they had a dairy farm and later a chicken farm.

Before they left, this group had a picture at Wrightstown, N.J. taken posing in the shape of a living Liberty Bell. This picture hangs on the wall of Rebecca's home. Stephen is seen positioned in the upper part above the bell. On August 24, Stephen went across on an English ship which was torpedoed on its next trip. He arrived in Liverpool, England, in September of 1918, went to South Hampton from where he crossed the English Channel to LeHavre, France. From LeHavre he was sent to Bordeaux, France, where he stayed six months and was then sent back to the states on the ship "Sedrick." He landed on March 9, 1919, and was honorably discharged at Camp Dodge on March 22, 1919.

Stephen became a painter and an interior decorator. His four living sons followed in his profession. They are Hubert, Raymond, Kenneth, and Spencer. Two sons died in infancy. Stephen developed a bad heart and passed away on November 30, 1970. Like his father, Anton, he was a Christian and a dear husband and father.

Rebecca, his wife, was born in Glenwood Township also. She studied music, taking lessons from her brother, Oscar, well known parochial school teacher in the Lutheran communities of Winneshiek County, and from Mrs. B. O. Marsh in Decorah. She attended school in Decorah, but spent most of the time prior to her marriage at home with her parents. She and Stephen, after leaving the Bolson parental farm, lived on Oak Street, then on Terrace Street, and in 1927 bought a home on Day Street, which is still Rebecca's home.

Hubert writes about his life as follows: "We moved to Decorah where my father became a painter. We lived on Oak Street, first, then on Terrace, and in 1927, we moved to Day Street. I can remember my father riding a bicycle to work, going sometimes as far as Luther College.

"Living with my Norwegian-speaking parents and grandparents, I naturally spoke that language and it wasn't until we moved to town and I had playmates that I learned to speak English.

"Some of my fondest memories are of vacations spent at my grandmother and grandfather Bolson's home. As a child, I tagged behind grandpa and his walking plow in what we called the 'long field.' This field had been an Indian campsite and the plowshares yielded up many Indian artifacts.

"For some reason insects never seemed to bother grandpa. He could go for hours without water and never took a thirst quencher to the fields with him.

"One day I went with grandpa in search of a new born calf which we found across the creek and up in the side hill. The calf was too fresh and wobbly to walk so grandpa picked it up and carried it home. After such an excursion as this, my hunger was appeased with grandma's cookies—2 big brown ones and 2 big white ones, carefully broken into a big cup of milk.

"I remember in the summer helping grandpa and grandma milk the cows in a little fenced-in area by the barn; grandpa always finished his meals with a spoonful of jam, sugar, or honey; grandma telling me about the time a bear came up on the northwest porch and finally wandered around to the south porch scaring grandma half to death before he went off into the woods; grandpa going to town for supplies, which to me consisted of bananas and pink and white peppermint candies with 4 x's on them.

"My mother was not in the best of health during the depression years, and I frequently went grocery shopping for her.

"With 4 small boys to feed and keep in clean clothes she had more than enough to keep her busy and yet she always found the time to do my father's book work.

"I went to school in Decorah, graduating in 1939. I worked for my father in the decorating business until I was inducted into the Army on July 3, 1942. After spending a year stateside, I served in the European theatre of operations for $2\frac{1}{2}$ years, receiving two Bronze stars. I was discharged December 14, 1945, and returned to

my family in Decorah where I continued to work with my father. Later my 3 brothers joined us and the business became known as S. B. Bolson & Sons. My father was not only a good business man but a man of high principles. He taught us all to not only put in an honest day's work for our customers, but to try to do the job better than it was done before. He believed 'It's the skill behind the brush that counts' and this phrase is still printed on the bottom of our statements."

Julius homesteaded in South Dakota, Camp Crook, Harding County in 1920 staying about one year. His brothers, Carl and Gilmer, lived in that area, as well as his sister, Emma Bolson Whitmore.

Johanna was born in Glenwood Township, Winneshiek County, Iowa, on the Thorer Bolson farm. She attended rural school. She married John Buer, who had come with his parents from Toten, Norway, when John was three years old. The couple began farming on a parcel of land Thorer set out for them adjoining his farm-They lived there until about 1911 when they went to South Dakota to take up land under the Homestead Act. Their oldest son had preceded them and wrote home about the fertile open prairie just awaiting them. In the spring of that year they set forth with three sons and two of their daughters, who ranged from 6 to 16 years of age, and took up land near Theodore, their oldest son. They remained in South Dakota until 1918 when they moved back to Iowa and took up residence at 508 East Main, Decorah, Iowa. Interesting sidelights on their life in South Dakota can be found under 12(10) 31 where Mary Rae Buer, Theodore's wife, writes more extensively about life on the prairies. In 1919 the Buers welcomed home their two sons, Carl and Emil, who had been through the thick of World War I. The children and grandchildren gathered at this home for years for Christmas Eve celebrations, birthdays, and other festivities. Grandma (Johanna) was famous for her lefsa, her hickory nut cake. In her declining years she took to using lots of red food coloring in her frostings. She was a quiet, stolid woman, who rarely raised her voice. She belonged to Decorah Lutheran Church and was active in the "Kvinde forening." She enjoyed good health all her life, was never in a hospital, and in her last year just slowly took to her bed and slept away at almost 85 years of age.

John, her husband, was a more aggressive man. He liked innovations. It is said he had one of the first telephones and one of the first Victrolas in the area. He took good care of his farm, avoiding erosion as best he could on his hilly land and was intrigued by the flat land of Dakota, but he returned He worked for A. R. Coffeen Construction Co. and for the Decorah Gas Co. laying gas mains. It was real concern to the family that he might sometime be overcome by the gas. electricity replaced gas lights, he was quick to make the change. He worked hard, delighted in his work, and often helped others. He shoveled walks late and early. He had gardens. He was a patient person and long suffering. His granddaughter, Esther Stephens Miller, recalls once when she was about 12 she served him applesauce and fresh bread for lunch on an afternoon that he had been hoeing potatoes. Unfortunately she had inadvertently put one cup of salt into the quart jar of unsweetened applesauce instead of sugar and poor grandpa patiently ate it down. granddaughter felt terrible when the mistake was discovered by her father who was not so slow to let it be known that the sauce John lived to be 89 years of age and was active was inedible. almost to the last.

Theodore Julius Buer b. Feb. 6, 1888 d. May 1972 m. Mary Rae Hipenstill b. May 1, 1889

Theodore, commonly called Teddy, was born in Winneshiek County, Iowa. His wife tells their story as follows:

"Teddy left Iowa in 1910 and located on a homestead near Gustave, South Dakota, 50 miles north of Belle F'ourche and 20 miles south of Camp Crook. He built a shack and began residence there that year.

"The next spring, 1911, his parents moved out to South Dakota and secured a homestead near him. With them were sons Emil, Alfred, Oscar, daughters Nellie and Carrie. All attended the school I taught. Carl Bolson, son of Anton Bolson, also came about this time. He homesteaded near 'The Buers.'

"In 1909 and 1910, I had taught school in eastern South Dakota and was then wanting a school, farther west, where there was homestead land. I was at my home in Indiana, summer of 1911, when I saw a small ad in a newspaper.

"The ad read: 'I locate people on government land. Send 25¢ for particulars.' Anchor Sorenson, Gustave, S. Dak. I answered the ad sending the 25¢ and asked him to send me the Co. Supt. of School's name and address. I mentioned that I wanted a school in September.

"Soon I received a letter from Mr. Sorenson. He said that he was Treasurer of the School Board, they were building a school house and needed a teacher. If I would send him some recommendations, he thought that he could get the school for me. I was promised the school, with information, as to $\underline{\text{when}}$ I should arrive and $\underline{\text{how}}$ to reach the vicinity.

"I left my Indiana home, rather sorrowful, but quite excited. I traveled by train to Belle F'ourche. From there, by a motor stage, I went to Harding—a village of a few homes, a post office, and General Store, a distance of 60 miles. From Harding, I rode with the mail carrier to Gustave, about 12 miles. He was the father of five children, whom I would have in school.

"It was in an old ox-cart, with large wooden wheels, that we rode, but he drove horses instead of oxen. We bounced over the rough, rutty, and rocky roads, which wound around and over small mountains, called the 'Short Pine Hills', then on the prairies for miles.

"The day was beautiful and we dined on wild plums and cookies.

"We finally arrived at Gustave which was a little post office in an 'Old Settler's' home. The mail was delivered to Mr. Sorenson and we drove to the mail carrier's home. I met his wife and children and then he took me to a Norwegian girl's shack 10' x 12'--where I was to board and room.

"The Norwegian girl's shack was dark, so he took me back to his home. There we met the girl and other neighbors who had come to pick up their mail. With my new found friends, I walked back to the shack, over sagebrush and cactus.

"School had to be delayed for one week, as the school house wasn't finished. It was being built by the fathers of the fifteen children who were to attend the school. These men plowed up the sod and cut it into large blocks. They laid these up, one on top of the other, for the walls. There was no frame to the building, so when the walls reached a certain height, wooden window frames were set in and then the walls continued on. There was a gabled roof of rough boards, covered with tar paper and sod on top of it. The floor was of rough boards and in the center of the building was a sturdy post, fastened securely to the floor below and to the roof above. It had a door at one end and two windows on each side of the building. It was quite comfortable even in sub-zero weather. When the children rubbed against the walls, clods of dirt fell to the floor, so that the sweeping raised a great cloud of dust. With a program and Box-Social at Christmas time, we were able to buy corrugated iron to cover the walls, which Teddy painted white. The children and I collected some pictures and made it look real cozy.

"My Norwegian girl married a neighbor homsteader in November and I was left alone in her shack. She could chop wood like a

man, but I found it quite difficult. I wondered how I would be able to chop enough wood to keep warm. To my wonder and surprise (as I approached the shack) there was a big pile of wood, all sawed and cut, ready to use. Dad Buer and a neighbor had turned the whole wood pile into stove wood.

"December, 1911, I filed on a homestead one mile from the school house, had my shack built and began living there in March. My dream had finally come true, to live on my own homestead and teach school nearby. As long as there was snow to melt, I had water for drinking, cooking, etc., but when warm weather came, I carried water from the nearest well, which was about one-fourth mile from my shack. The well hadn't been cleaned out for quite awhile, as the owner had gone east. The cover consisted of some loose boards laid over the top. I used a pail with a weight on it and a rope attached to draw up the water. I kept getting dead rabbits, snakes, mice, etc., in each pailful and kept pouring out the water. Finally, I decided that would have to be my water and by boiling it, knew that it would be safe to drink. You just know though, it didn't go down so well.

"I remained on my homestead all summer and taught the school again the next year. This was 1912, and I believe it was that year that Gilmer Bolson, Carl's brother, came and lived on a homestead, near Carl.

"The next year (1913) Teddy and I were married and decided to make our home on my homestead. We bought a building 16' x 24' from a neighbor, who had proved up his land and gone east. During the next few years, when time and money permitted, this building and my shack, with other lumber and supplies, Teddy converted these into a nice three-room house with full basement, inside stairway to the basement, wash room, and closets.

"I think it was the summer of 1914 that Teddy took a job, herding sheep, for three brothers who were ranchers five miles from our home. One Sunday, very lonely, I decided to try and walk over to see Teddy about six miles away where he was living in a sheep-wagon located on a big lonely tract of land called Beaver Dam Flat. The brothers' ranch, about four miles away from the wagon, was the nearest home. We had a happy visit while the sheep were on water. When it became cooler and the sheep moved out to graze, Teddy and his dog followed and it became cloudy and soon began to rain. I had gotten two apple pies into the hot oven and had a large kettle of food cooking on the stove when the wind began to blow briskly and it began to rain real hard.

"The wheels on the sheep-wagon had been taken off to be repaired and the wagon was resting on two large saw horses. Teddy could see the wagon rocking in the wind and hurried back just in time to pull me out the door, as it toppled over. The dog and I found a little shelter beside it as Teddy grappled with the hot stove. Soon it was quite dark and raining and hailing very hard. When the storm subsided, by flashes of

lightning, we saw that there were several feet of water in the wagon, pies and other items of food, butter, bread, kerosene, etc., were all mixed up together, with my beautiful panama hat, floating on top. There was nothing to eat and we didn't have a stitch of dry clothing on, nor any to put on.

"There seemed nothing left to do but try to find our way to the ranch across the miles of gumbo, sagebrush, and cactus. We waded streams and struggled through mud and arrived about ten o'clock where we received food, dry clothing, and a place to sleep. About three a.m. Teddy was aroused by one of the brothers. He with the rancher, saddled over the 'Flat', found that the sheep hadn't been visited by the coyotes, for this often happened early in the morning. There was much to be thankful for.

"Teddy and his Dad rigged up a telephone line between our places, so we were the first ones to have a telephone. He and his Dad dug a number of wells by using shovels and a windlass. Some were over 30 feet deep, producing plenty of good soft water.

"In the City of Lead, in the Black Hills, about 80 miles away, we heard of many idle windmills. City water had replaced them. Teddy and his Dad, with team and wagon, drove to Lead and purchased two 40-foot tower windmills. They took them apart, piece by piece marking them, brought them home, and reassembled them. What a blessing it was to be able to irrigate our gardens, water the stock, etc.

"One of the first years of our marriage, Teddy purchased a lovely team of Clydesdale horses, named Star and King, hoping to raise some heavy draft horses. Star's first colt, at 8 months old, was killed by a gray wolf and not long after that, Star was killed by lightning. King was all we had left.

"That summer an old settler, ten miles away, was building a lovely new home and hired Teddy to paint, so I was alone. On a beautiful but lonely Sunday morning I decided to go down to see Teddy and see how the work on the house was progressing. My neighbor had a white pony, which I borrowed and hitched up with King, to the buggy. King was gentle, but so large and tall that I had to get on a chair to bridle and get the harness on him. What a nice buggy ride I had. King was ahead most of the time, sort of pulling the pony along. How I wish that I had a picture of this!

"It was in 1917 that we purchased our first car, a Model T Ford. I hadn't learned to drive it when Teddy went to Omaha with stock. He would be gone a week or ten days, and how I wished that I could drive the car. I began studying the instruction book and realized that my first problem was to get the car safely out of the garage. A rancher asked to borrow our car. He had broken down his car and needed to get repairs. I asked him to leave our car out in the barnyard when he returned the next day. I really studied the instruction book that night and as soon as the rancher

delivered the car and left, I was able to crank the Model T and got it started. I practiced driving awhile and then called up a neighbor lady and invited her to go with me to Belle F'ourche. By the time we got to town and back (100 miles), I felt quite efficient at the wheel.

"About 1916 or 1917, we bought a small band of sheep and continued with sheep until about 1933. From then on until we moved to California we raised cattle.

Our son, Glendon, was born in the fall of 1919. spring, one day not long before 'lambing time', we started for Belle F'ourche, to get supplies and also hoped to get our baby's picture taken. It began raining and by the time we reached the heavy gumbo roads, it was difficult to get the car up the hills. At the foot of a hill, as Teddy scraped mud from the wheels, I would carry the baby to the top of the hill, lay him on a blanket, beside the road, and go down to help push the car to the hilltop. We would pick up the baby and ride happily down the hill and on until we reached another hill. After a few miles in this way and still about 10 miles from town, the car broke down and we were left It was raining quite hard and we were happy to get into a spring wagon with a man driving to town. We had gone a couple of miles when a car came and we were offered a ride into town. this car was having trouble in the mud and the man in the spring wagon overtook us. With the baby, I got in with him again and got Teddy remained in the car to help push, so he and the into town. man also arrived in town. It was late in the evening and we stayed with friends that night. It kept raining all night, so the next day Teddy purchased hip boots and a raincoat and walked home the 50 miles. I didn't get the baby's picture taken by the photographer, as he died the night we arrived in town. Where I was staying, their teenage daughter was practicing on taking pictures and finishing them. How happy we were for some that she took of our son, as they turned out quite well and were the only baby pictures we had of him. It was about two weeks before the baby and I arrived home.

"Through the years, Teddy built 13 earthen dams to store the water from rain and melting snow. These were built with a fresno and four horses. One day he was repairing and enlarging one of these dams and I was herding the sheep. He had set up a Tepee tent so that we could eat our lunch in the shade, and I would have protection from the hot sun while the sheep were on water. neighbor, in a field nearby, was burning Russian Thistles when a strong wind came up and started a prairie fire. It was traveling fast and we wondered how we could stop it. Finally the men grabbed the tent between them hoping to find rocks or something for a weight to drag along the fire line. There seemed to be nothing to find, so I hurriedly jumped into the tent for weight. They dragged me swiftly over the fire line, sagebrush, cactus, and rough ground. How thankful we were to get the fire stopped, and I was alright in about two weeks, though bruised and battered, at the time.

"In the fall of 1928, a natural gas pipeline was installed between Glendive, Montana and the Black Hills. We had it piped

3,200 feet from the main line to our house. The day before Easter, spring of 1929, we attended a neighbor's auction sale. The Gilmer Bolsons were there and came home with us to visit and have dinner. About 8 o'clock there was a terrible gas explosion and our house was bursted and blown apart. There was fire over us, under us, and around us, but all seven of us escaped safely. The house and all contents burned quickly and we found refuge in our bunk house. How thankful we were to be safe, and I often think it was like the Hebrew children who were thrown into the fiery furnace, 'Not a hair of our head singed. . . nor the smell of fire on us.' That Scripture is Daniel 3:27.

"Teddy spent 26 years in South Dakota, and I 25 years. We found it a healthy and delightful climate, and where we were the soil was very rich and good. The Buffalo grass on the prairies was rich and stock fattened on it. However, in all the years that we were there, I can remember of only three good years when we harvested good crops of grain. Often the rain didn't come when needed or hot winds or hail destroyed the crops. We also had a seige of army worms that ate everything in their path. Finally in 1936, the grasshoppers ate everything, so everyone had to sell their stock. It was very difficult getting the stock to the railroad and on to Omaha, Neb. We received $2\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ for our veal and, of course, much less for the older animals.

"We decided to go to California for the winter and bought an acre and just forgot to go back to South Dakota. We paid the taxes on our 2,200 acres of land there for two years and then decided to forget about it. We really had to start all over again in California but the Lord was good to us. In 1966 we purchased a home in Leisure World, Laguna Hills, California, where I still live. Teddy passed away in May, 1972. Our son, a retired Lt. Col., lives about 40 miles from me."

Glendon was born in Bell F'ourche, South Dakota. He finished the grades in the country school near the Buer Ranch and attended high school in Belle F'ourche. In 1936 the Buers moved to California and Glendon graduated from Narbonne High School in Lomita, California. After high school he worked in the office of the Van Camp Sea Food Company on Terminal Island, California. In 1940 he became interested in the Flying Cadet program of the Army Air Corps. He took the qualifying two-year college equivalent examination in June of 1941 and was awaiting the results when the attack on Pearl Harbor occurred. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps and shortly after was notified of his acceptance as an Aviation Cadet. After pilot training in California and Arizona, he received his commission and "wings" at Luke Field, Arizona, on September 29, 1942. He served as a fighter pilot in Oregon, Washington, and California before going to England in October 1943.

On March 20, 1943, he married Elnor Jane Benson and he rejoined her in Nevada after completing his combat tour in the 8th and 9th Air Forces flying the long range version of the P-51 (Mustang). A son, Timothy John Buer, was born to them on October 21, 1945, in Las Vegas, Nevada. Glendon received a regular commission in the Air Force in 1947 and decided to make the service his career. Josephine was born in Glenwood Township and attended the Baker School in that township. She was confirmed in the Pontipodan Church. As a young woman she came to Decorah and worked in a number of households as maid, cook, or babysitter. Then she went to work as assistant cook for the Luther College Boarding Club. The young women who worked there lived on the campus and were instructed not to entice the boys in the "College for Men" away from their studies.

In about 1913 she and her cousin, Emma Bolson, decided to go to South Dakota where other members of both the Bolson and the Buer families were already living. Josephine took up a homestead claim, lived in her shack on weekends and rode horseback to a job in the nearest town for the week days. Melvin Stephens, who had also grown up in Glenwood Township, moved west also and took up a claim adjoining Josephine's and on August 11, 1914, they were They moved their shacks side by side and had a two-room Melvin worked for Peter Bonfield helping build dams to conserve moisture. He would go to the Short Pine Hills for his wood supply. He corraled horses that ran wild in the land and would break them to ride and to drive. He became a skillful He helped Mr. Bonfield build the first Lutheran Church horseman. in the area, and it so happened that he was the first man to be married in the church, Mr. Bonfield the first to be buried from the church, and Josephine and Melvin's daughter, Esther, the first child to be baptized in the church.

Late in 1918 Josie and Melvin decided to return to Iowa with their two small children. As Josephine has often said, "We got out while we still had money enough so we could." The winter of 1918-19 was cold and rugged. Melvin worked on the railroad section and hauled coal for Ingvoldstad Lumber Co. rigorous and unpleasant work. That winter the "flu" was rampant and Josephine was ill with it for a time. The quarantine imposed on households where people were ill was not too effective because after dark neighbors would help one another out and smuggle in hot food to whomever needed it the most. In the spring the family moved to a farm in Springfield Township, there followed several tenant farm jobs up until 1925 when Melvin bought a home in Decorah on Winneshiek Avenue. He also bought a cream route with an old truck and a pair of mules. Besides hauling cream for years, he bought and hauled cordwood, plowed gardens, spliced ropes for farmers, and trimmed trees in his spare time. In 1942 Melvin and Josie sold their home and purchased the old Buer home on East Main Street in Decorah. There they lived until Melvin died Josephine moved to Center Street and lived next to her in 1960. daughter and family. Later she moved to Viewlawn Apartments where she lived seven years, after which she came to live with her daughter, Esther Miller, in her home two miles south of Decorah and lived there four years until the spring of 1978 when she entered the Eastern Star Rest Home at Decorah.

Esther was born in Capitol, Montana. Her parents were living in Harding County, South Dakota, but in order to have the services of a midwife, her mother, Josephine Stephens, went to Capitol to await the child's birth. At the age of 3 she came with her parents and a younger sister to live in Decorah, Iowa. The family lived that first winter (1918-19) on Washington Street. School for which he got about \$90 a month. In January 1952 we began farming on halves for Leonard Ryan, who had heard that Howard was a hard worker and a good farmer. This was a big move for us. We would have electricity instead of kerosene lamps and gasoline engines. We had had three very hard years behind us. These things sound silly now 27 years later, but we had a Brown Swiss heifer calf we almost lost with the scours. Our barn was so cold we took the calf into the house. We used old newspapers on the floors and walls and tied the calf to the leg of the heating stove. We fed it raw eggs (a remedy of Grandpa Hill's) and medicine. The children were in their glory having a baby calf to play with. The house wasn't much warmer than the barn. I couldn't wash the floor if it was below zero or we would have a skating rink. The calf became well. We took it to the barn and tied it in front of the cows. Later we found it had hung itself. I was so sick I cried, and Howard thought we were fighting a losing battle.

"When we moved to the Ryan farm in January of 1952 we milked about 22 cows and raised pigs and chickens. Our third daughter, Vicki, was born on September 6, 1953. By this time we were adjusting to many hours of hard work in a day. When Vicki was six days old I took her to the barn in a wooden apple box where she slept while I milked cows. Then Joyce, our oldest, convinced me she was big enough to watch the baby. I made so many trips from the barn to the house I almost wore out a pair of shoes the first week. It wasn't long until she could feed, burp, and change Vicki.

"On October 30, 1954, our first son was born. We named him Ronald. He grew up fast and lived on the John Deere tractor with his father. By 1960 we had three more children, two girls and a boy, Marvin. That year we quit farming, and I had surgery when Marvin was born. We had no hospital insurance, so it was a good thing we were having a farm sale because my hospital and doctor bills were almost \$700. We had a real good sale, thanks to our many good neighbors.

"Howard began to work at Berg Implement and then got on at HyGrade at Postville (a meat plant). In March of 1961 he was laid off. We lived on \$35 a week unemployment for awhile, but took a farm job, because with seven children and \$40 a month rent we couldn't live on that. In February of 1962 a cow jumped on Howard's leg while he was milking and fractured his ankle. He was in the hospital ten days, had surgery, and had a pin put in his ankle. The man we worked for told us we would have to pay rent and buy our milk until Howard could work. On the first of April we moved to a farm house south of Monona. After some argument with Howard, I got a job at the turkey plant in Postville. In December of 1962 we rented a house west of Postville which had a bathroom. This was a big deal because it was the first one we'd had. (Howard thought the outside one was better because he didn't have to stand in line for In April of 1963 Howard got back on at Hy-Grade. that one.) in March of 1964 he had a nervous breakdown. He was hospitalized until August, went back to work for two or three days, but couldn't take it. He went back to the hospital until Thanksgiving when they released him but told him he could not go back to work until March. It was the most wonderful Thanksgiving the kids and I ever had. We had Howard home after one awfully long year. Hy-Grade had kept his job open for him, and he has been there ever since.

"We bought an old house in Monona in June of 1965. In 1974 we built a new house. We tore down the old one and put up a split foyer. We moved in in September of that year. We are pretty proud of our family and our home. It took many struggling years, but it's been worth it. We are so thankful our children are all so close to home. We love to have our grandchildren come and stay with us. They may go home a little spoiled, but I tell the parents that's what Grandpas and Grandmas are for."

Madison St., Chicago. He became president and business manager and publisher of the West Town Advance, a weekly newspaper. He was director of the West Town State Bank.

Joseph drove the first car ever to be seen in Decorah. The story goes that he bought it one day in Chicago and started for Decorah the next.

In June of 1923 he wanted to see his home land once more. Against his doctor's advice, he, his wife, and a niece sailed for England. On September 7th a cablegram arrived to relatives in the states saying Joe had died in Vichy, France. He was brought to Chicago and buried on September 28 at Forest Home Cemetery. Newspaper accounts stated that West Town's leading civic leaders attended the funeral to honor him.
